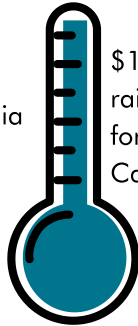

Survivor Story

Jessica was born in Louisiana, but she didn't stay there long. In fact, she never stayed anywhere long. Her mother moved constantly, stringing Jessica's childhood through different towns, cities, and states. Jessica didn't know her father at all. She saw him just once. Because they never put roots down, Jessica never had things that are staples in most homes – a room of her own, a mattress. For a time, she and her mother were even homeless. Jessica's mom did what she could to bring in a few dollars. Sometimes her mother brought a man home for the night. Some nights she didn't come home at all.

They moved to Atlanta when Jessica was ten. Soon after, her mother left her with a nineteen-year-old male babysitter named Ervin. It was the beginning of a nightmare. Ervin molested her sexually, then threatened to hurt her if she ever told anyone. Confused and scared, Jessica kept quiet. The abuse continued for the next two years.

When Jessica was twelve, her drug-addicted mother disappeared. It was not unusual for her mother to not come back at night, but this time she did not come back at all. Jessica didn't know what to do. Ervin told her how she could make some cash. He introduced her to an old man. Desperate and knowing she needed money to survive, she agreed to sleep with him.

Ervin soon became Jessica's pimp. He controlled who she had sex with and when, where she lived, and the money she earned. It was a miserable life for a young [child], but Jessica saw no options. She had no family or friends to help her. She was trapped.

In 2010, when Jessica was fifteen, the nightmare took an even darker turn. A "client" who Ervin arranged for her turned out to be an undercover policeman. She was arrested and put in a juvenile detention facility – all for a crime [that was committed against her]. The judge gave her two choices: jail or a program for young women called Wellspring Living. Scared and numb, she chose the program.
